St. Therese of Lisieux made a point of going the extra mile in kindness towards those people who really got under her skin. It was part of her own brand of Everyday Stewardship — thanking God for all His creation, even the parts with which, in her own humanness, she struggled to cope.

I think about this a lot when I challenge myself to give thanks for things that bother me and people who challenge me. When I do this, I envision Christ giving thanks over those insufficient loaves. How many of us would see that paltry little basket and kick a rock in frustration because we can't feed all our people? "You didn't give me enough, Lord! You didn't give me enough patience, enough money, enough creativity, enough stamina to

be a good steward. If you had given me more, I could also give more!"

In those moments of despair, we need to take a good look at the life God has given us. We need to look at the trials and the challenges and the shortcomings. The hopes that didn't pan out, the disappointments that keep cropping up. Somewhere therein lies what we need to be the steward God asks us to be, just as St. Therese's own stewardship was defined by the people she simply couldn't stand. God does not give us all we want. He does not give us all we ask for. He does us one better: He gives us all we need. It's all in the basket.

RETREAT IN DAILY LIFE St. Ignatius of Loyola October 2021-April 2022

Retreat in Daily Life (RIDL) is the common designation of the 19th Annotation St. Ignatius of Loyola wrote into his Spiritual Exercises. These spiritual exercises evolved through St. Ignatius' own experience as he transformed from a soldier to a servant of our loving God. As you mirror his prayerful journey, following the life, teachings, death and resurrection of Jesus, you will prayerfully encounter a loving God and desire to become all you were created to be.

First Steps: If you are interested in RIDL, contact one of the facilitators listed to schedule an initial interview. Interviews will take place July 1 through August 31. The interview process is an opportunity for you to learn more about the retreat, to discern whether or not you are ready to make the retreat at this time, and to begin prayer practices that prepare a person for the retreat experience.

Format: During the course of 30 weeks - from October through April, each retreatant commits to these three experiences: 1. Daily private prayer, 2. Weekly small group meetings, 3. Twice monthly individual spiritual direction

The fee for the retreat is \$490.00 plus a director fee that must be coordinated with your Spiritual Director. In keeping with the Rule of Benedict governing hospitality, those who have been blessed with more may wish to contribute more and those who have less give less, so that "all may be at peace in the house of God." ScholarshiPsalms are available. To inquire about a scholarship, contact the Spiritual Director in your area.

Explained:



Question: We are considering homeschooling our children. Does this present a problem when it is time for them to receive the sacraments? What must we do?

Answer: Homeschooling is legal in all fifty states and like other types of education, has its advantages and its drawbacks. There are many factors to consider, and each family has to decide what the best way to educate its children is. With religious education, many dioceses have a formal policy that outlines procedures and expectations, some of which include more than just academic information. Call the religious education office to find out what they are for your area.

In general, though, an appointment with your parish priest to discuss your situation is the best first step. An opportunity to discuss what is available, what the expectations are for each sacrament, and how you can best prepare your child helps make your time of preparation more effective. The priest can direct you to good catechetical materials, parent information classes, and other choices and possibilities for your child. All parents need to be part of their child's religious education, taking a lead in instilling the values and beliefs of their faith.

Inspiration for the week





To the people of the Diocese of Little Rock,

In view of the publication today of the Apostolic Letter "*Traditionis Custodes*" issued by Pope Francis in which he revokes, effective immediately, permissions regarding the use of the Roman Liturgy in place prior to the reform of 1970—the *Vetus Ordo* Mass (i.e., the Traditional Latin Mass, hereafter called the Latin Mass) granted by Pope Benedict XVI in his Apostolic Letter "*Summorum Pontificium*," it is incumbent on me as your bishop to indicate the implications of this change for our diocese.

Let me state clearly from the outset that the restrictions on the use of the Latin Mass imposed by *Traditionis Custodes* do not apply to our two personal parishes for the celebration of the Latin Mass: St. John the Baptist parish in Cabot and Our Lady of Sorrows parish in Springdale. There is no change for these parishes or the priests serving them. All that is required of them and the Fraternity of St. Peter (FSSP) priests serving them is that they accept the validity and legitimacy of the liturgical reform of Vatican II, which they do. *Traditionis Custodes* does caution me not to establish any additional personal parishes for the celebration of the Latin Mass going forward.

To understand the reason for *Traditionis Custodes* and the need to revoke the provisions of *Summorum Pontificium*, it is important to realize that *Summorum Pontificium* sought to foster the healing of the schism of Archbishop Lefebre and others who rejected not only the liturgical reforms of Vatican II but indeed often the Council itself. As it turned out, not only did *Summorum Pontificium* not achieve that purpose, the unintended result in many places was to create further division within parishes and among priests. *Traditionis Custodes* is the result of consultation among bishops in 2020 and seeks to foster unity by removing this source of division in our parishes. The main impact locally will be:

- 1) *Traditionis Custodes* (Art. 3, no. 2) indicates that the Latin Mass is not to be celebrated in regular parish Churches and so will no longer be celebrated in El Dorado, Mountain Home or Cherokee Village. I am to designate locations where the Latin Mass can be celebrated, and these are the personal parishes of St. John the Baptist in Cabot and Our Lady of Sorrows in Springdale.
- 2) *Traditionis Custodes* (Art. 5) indicates that priests who already celebrate the Latin Mass must request permission from the bishop to continue to enjoy this faculty. Here, for non-FSSP priests, that would be exclusively for the private celebration of the Latin Mass since the public celebration of the Latin Mass in Arkansas is to occur only in the two personal parishes entrusted to the FSSP.

The *Novus Ordo* Mass is to be celebrated according to the rubrics provided for that Mass. The *Novus Ordo* Mass can be celebrated by any priest in any language, including Latin and Latin service music can always be used, but elements of the Traditional Latin Mass are not to be grafted onto the *Novus Ordo* Mass, regardless of whether it is celebrated in Latin or the vernacular.
