Lenten Prayers and Devotions

- Begin each morning with the prayer: "Lord, I offer you this day, and all that I think, and do, and say."
- Attend [Daily Mass](#) as often as possible.
- Pray the [Sorrowful Mysteries](#) of the Rosary.
- Make the [Stations of the Cross](#) at home or in a parish celebration.
- Read Scripture for 10 minutes every day.
- Pray the Seven Penitential Psalms (Psalm 6, 31, 50, 101, 129 and 142).
- Spend some time in quiet prayer before the Blessed Sacrament.
- Abstain from meat for an extra day or two each week.
- Listen to spiritual music or a spiritual speaker.
- Keep a Lenten journal with your spiritual insights, special intentions, people you want to pray for, hurts and disappointments that you want to offer up, and progress reports on your Lenten resolutions.

I WANT TO BE AN USHER

PHISHING ... DON'T FALL FOR IT

Phishing is a way for criminals to get money out of you by pretending to be someone you trust...someone like Father Jim. They are very clever and tech-savvy; they will add real logos and real-looking page links to their requests for personal information or money. When you get a suspicious email or text message, check the address it comes from or text back using a phone number you already have, not the one they provide. If the email address is from a foreign country (suffixes like .ru or .bg or .za or .ug), odds are they're phishing. **And always remember that Father Jim will NEVER ask you for money via text or email. Being Catholic ...

Why do I have to attend Mass? Why can't I pray at home or in the woods surrounded by God's creation.

Often, people will suggest that going to Sunday Mass is not necessary. After all, they can pray at home just as well. This has clearly been an issue in the Church for more than a millennium. In the fourth century, St. John Chrysostom addressed this problem directly:

"You cannot pray at home as at church, where there is a great multitude, where exclamations are cried out to God as from one great heart, and where there is something more: the union of minds, the accord of souls, the bond of charity, the prayers of the priests." (CCC, no. 2179, quoting St. John Chrysostom, *De incomprehensibili* 3, 6: PG 48, 725)

Private prayer, though essential to the spiritual life, can never replace the celebration of the eucharistic Liturgy and the reception of Holy Communion.

Celebrating the Sunday Eucharist—though central and essential—does not complete our observance of Sunday. In addition to attending Mass each Sunday, we should also refrain "from those activities which impede the worship of God and disturb the joy proper to the day of the Lord or the necessary relaxation of mind and body" (*Compendium of the Catechism of the Catholic Church*, no. 453).

To celebrate the Lord's Day more fully, consider trying the following:

- ✕ Don't use Sunday as your catch-all day for errands and household chores.
- ✕ Share a family dinner after Mass. Have the whole family join in the preparation and cleanup.
- ✕ Go for a walk or bike ride and give thanks to God for the beauty of nature.
- ✕ Spend time reading the Bible or a spiritual book.
- ✕ Pray the Rosary or the Liturgy of the Hours, alone or with others.
- ✕ Volunteer in a local food pantry.
- ✕ Visit parishioners and others who are homebound.
- ✕ Read Bible stories to your children.
- ✕ Turn off your gadgets and enjoy the silence.

As we take time each week to celebrate the Paschal Mystery in the Eucharist and to rest from the burdens of our daily lives, we remind ourselves that we are made in the image and likeness of God who "rested on the seventh day from all the work he had undertaken" (Gn 2:2).

Peter, John, and James witness the transfiguration that revealed Jesus' divinity. Why do you think the three apostles "fell silent" from this encounter?

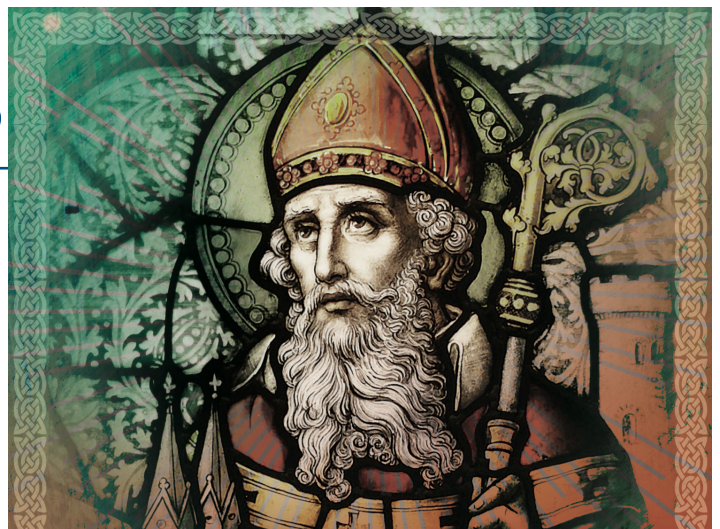
PRAYER
